Social diversity does not threaten democracy. In India, three primary social divisions intersect dynamically with political life:

1. Gender & Politics

- Social construct vs. biology
- Sexual division of labour
- Women's political representation
- *Assessment:* Healthy expression

2. Religion & Politics

- Moral values vs. communalism
- Forms of communal politics
- Indian Secular State framework
- *Assessment:* Potentially dangerous

3. Caste & Politics

- Hereditary occupational hierarchy
- Caste in politics (mobilisation)
- Politics in caste (politicisation)
- *Assessment:* Both positive & negative

SECTION 2 & 3 — CORE DEFINITIONS & KEY CONCEPTS

Sexual Division of Labour

A system in which all household and care work inside the domestic sphere is either done by women of the family or organised by them through domestic helpers, leaving outward income-generating public roles to men.

Communalism / Communal Politics

A political ideology based on the belief that religion is the principal basis of social and political community, asserting that followers of a religion share identical secular interests and stand in opposition to followers of other religions.

Feminist

A woman or a man who believes in, advocates for, and works toward equal rights, entitlements, and opportunities for women and men in all spheres of life.

Family Laws

Civil laws that govern personal and familial matters such as marriage, divorce, maintenance, adoption, and inheritance. In India, distinct family laws apply to followers of different religions.

Patriarchy

Literally "*rule by father*"; a social and cultural system that values men more, assigns them dominance, and gives them power and authority over women.

Occupational Mobility & Caste Hierarchy

Occupational Mobility: The transition from one vocation to another across generations. **Caste Hierarchy:** A rigid ladder-like social structure ranking castes from 'highest' to 'lowest'.

SECTION 5 — IN-DEPTH CONCEPT BREAKDOWN

1. Gender Disadvantage & The Role of Politics

- **Social Construct vs. Biology:** Gender inequality is rooted in social expectations and stereotyping, not nature. When domestic tasks (cooking, tailoring) are monetized, men take them up readily.
- **Unpaid & Invisible Labour:** Time-use surveys show women work on average 1 hour more per day than men, but domestic labour is unpaid and unacknowledged.
- **Positive Political Expression:** Feminist movements turned private discrimination into a public issue, securing legal rights, anti-harassment laws, and legislative representation.

2. Religion: Moral Values vs. Communalism

Healthy / Moral Expression

- **Gandhiji's View:** Politics must be guided by universal ethics drawn from all religions, not dogma.
- **Human Rights:** Demands for state protection of minorities and riot prevention.
- **Family Law Reform:** Women's movements advocating to eliminate anti-women bias in religious personal laws.

Communal Politics (Dangerous)

- **Everyday Prejudices:** Stereotypes and beliefs in religious superiority.
- **Majoritarian Dominance:** Attempt by majority to rule; or minority demanding separate political units.
- **Divisive Mobilisation:** Using sacred symbols, fear, and religious leaders for electoral gain.
- **Communal Violence:** Extreme riots and bloodshed (e.g., Partition 1947).

3. The Four Constitutional Pillars of the Indian Secular State

1. No Official Religion: Unlike Sri Lanka (Buddhism), Pakistan (Islam), or England (Christianity), India accords no state status to any religion.

3. Non-Discrimination: Article 15 strictly prohibits state discrimination against any citizen based on religion.

2. Freedom to Practice: All citizens and communities have the constitutional right to profess, practice, and propagate any religion or none.

4. Principled Intervention: State can intervene in religious matters to ensure equality and justice (e.g., abolition of Untouchability via Art. 17).

4. The Two-Way Dynamic: Caste and Politics

A. Caste in Politics (Influence on Elections)

- Parties calculate constituency caste demographics when selecting candidates.
- Direct appeals made to caste sentiment and traditional loyalties.
- Universal adult franchise empowered lower castes with numerical voting strength.

B. Politics in Caste (Politicisation of Caste)

- **Incorporation:** Castes expand by incorporating sub-castes previously excluded.
- **Coalitions:** Different caste groups enter into dialogue and power negotiations.
- **New Formations:** Emergence of broad groups like 'backward' and 'forward' blocs.

★ MUST REMEMBER — WHY CASTE ALONE CANNOT DETERMINE INDIAN ELECTIONS

1. **No Single-Caste Dominance:** No parliamentary constituency has a clear single-caste majority; winning requires multi-caste alliances.
2. **No Total Monopolisation:** No party bags 100% votes of any caste; "vote banks" only indicate a preferred majority share.
3. **Multiple Same-Caste Nominees:** Rival parties often field candidates from the same dominant caste, dividing that vote.
4. **Anti-Incumbency:** Sitting MPs/MLAs frequently lose elections—impossible if caste preferences were permanent and rigid.

SECTION 6 & 7 — COMMON MISTAKES & EXAM TRAPS

⚠ COMMON MISTAKE: CONFUSING CASTE REALITY

Mistake: Assuming caste has completely disappeared due to urbanization and laws.

CBSE Correction: While public dining taboos and untouchability are outlawed, *marriage within caste* (*endogamy*) and *economic inequality* strongly persist today.

⚠ COMMON MISTAKE: CONFUSING SECULARISM

Mistake: Thinking Indian secularism means the state strictly ignores religion completely.

CBSE Correction: Unlike strict Western separation, Indian secularism practices *principled distance* and retains the authority to intervene to reform social evils (e.g., banning untouchability).
